WHAT DISTRICT 11 CAN DO WITH A \$42M MILL LEVY OVERRIDE

Safe and Healthy Learning and Working Environment

- Increase number of nurses, school counselors, etc., to improve comprehensive student support model
- Expansion of School Resource Officers

Class Size Reduction

- Add teachers to reduce pupil/teacher ratio in all classrooms

Attraction, Recruitment, and Retention of Quality Staff

- Increase teacher pay to market
- Increase educational support professional pay to market

School Technology Enhancements

- Refresh/upgrade/update existing technology
- Improve network security and keep up with network growth
- Improve computer technician-to-device ratio

Maintain School Buildings

- Building repairs, major maintenance, technical infrastructure updates and modernization projects

Charter School Funding

- Approximately \$1,000 per pupil for each of the District's charter schools

FACTS AND FIGURES

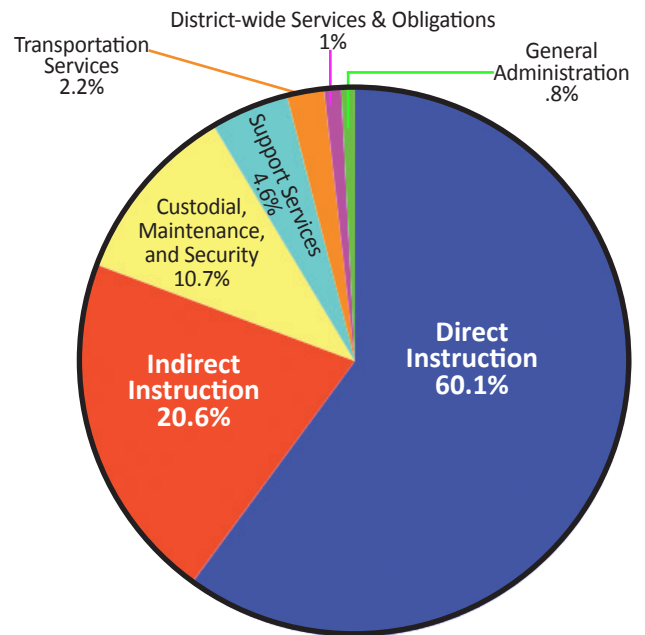
Colorado ranks **41st** in per-pupil spending, and spent **\$2,685 less per-pupil** than the national average in 2013-14, according to data gathered by the Colorado School Finance Project. In addition, 2013-14 was the fifth year of Colorado's Negative Factor/Rescissions:

- FY 2016-17 \$830M
- FY 2015-16 \$830M
- FY 2014-15 \$880M
- FY 2013-14 \$1.004B
- FY 2012-13 \$1.001B
- FY 2011-12 \$774M
- FY 2010-11 \$381M

From 2013-14 to 2014-15, the average teacher salary *declined* from \$49,606 to \$48,277, a \$1,329 *decrease*. In addition, the 2014-15 salary is more than \$9,000 *below* the national average and more than \$7,500 *below* the 2009-10 inflation-adjusted average salary for Colorado, which is about \$12,500 *below* the 1992-93 inflation-adjusted figure.
